Rebate Guide for Heating & Cooling Systems in Washington State

Step 1: Identify Your Utility Provider

Ask who their electric utility is (PSE, Seattle City Light, SnoPUD, Avista, etc.). Utility rebates vary widely.

Step 2: Confirm Equipment Type

Clarify if they're installing: Ductless Mini Split, Ducted Heat Pump, Furnace Replacement, or Oil Conversion.

Step 3: Match Utility Rebates

PSE: Up to \$1,500 | Seattle City Light: \$500–\$1,500 | SnoPUD: \$1,800–\$2,500 | Avista: \$1,450+ | Seattle Clean Heat: Up to \$4,000 (oil to heat pump).

Step 4: Add State & Federal Incentives

WA HEAR Rebates (2025, income-qualified). Federal IRA Rebates (coming 2025). Federal Tax Credits: Up to \$2,000 for heat pumps, \$1,200 for other upgrades (through 2032).

Step 5: Gather Documents

Utility account #, proof of residency, AHRI #, system model info, and photos/invoices.

Step 6: Submit Rebates in Order

1) Utility rebate application (filed by contractor). 2) Federal tax credit (IRS Form 5695). 3) State rebate programs (available 2025).

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
